Through our global network of chaplains, staff and volunteers we offer practical, emotional and spiritual support to seafarers through ship visits as well as in our "home away from home".

Did you know that seafaring is one of the world's most dangerous occupations? Were you aware that over 90% of world trade is carried by sea, providing work to 1.5 million seafarers. Shipping is also one of the world's most dangerous occupations. The rate

of suicide for international seafarers is triple that of shore workers, and they are 26 times more likely to be killed at work, with the threat of piracy still being very real. Their days at sea are long and demanding and loneliness is common. Seafarers in distress at sea have no one to turn to as no one can see or hear their cries for help. It is only when they finally reach land and can reach out to their Mission contacts that they are able to gain assistance and connect with loved ones. The Mission's warm hospitality can make all the difference to their morale.

Without the incredible support provided by our amazing and hard-working base of volunteers and the generous donations from all our supporters we would be unable to continue to offer our services.
