Successful Vaccine Initiative

for Seafarers visiting Halifax, Nova Scotia

Working together enabled over 160 seafarers to be vaccinated while in our Port. Our discussions with Nova Scotia Public Health requesting assistance with our vaccine initiative for seafarers resulted in the support of their professional teams within community clinics, pharmacies and the IWK Health Centre.

Nova Scotia protocols dictate that all seafarers produce a negative COVID test before presenting for vaccines. We are grateful to Nova Scotia Public Health for providing COVID-19 rapid antigen tests to our Mission. We thank the IWK staff & volunteers for their cooperation and patience during seafarer

visits. Mission staff and volunteers coordinated appointments and transported crew members from ships to clinics in Halifax to receive their first and second doses of vaccine. Everyone counts and working together with Ship Owners, Agents, Port Authorities and Government Agencies we can help make seafarers safe from Covid. We also thank Fady Faltas, Pharmacy Manager and his team at Lawtons Drugs, Bedford.

Who We Are and What We Do

The Company of Master Mariners of Canada is a nautical professional association with members serving in command at sea as well as members serving in management positions ashore in private and public sectors or as pilots, surveyors, practising law and teaching in nautical schools. Our purpose may be summarized as follows: to provide a representative, professional body for Canadians qualified to command merchant ships, to encourage a high standard of practical proficiency and professional conduct in officers of the Canadian Merchant Service, to offer the experience and nautical expertise to Courts of Inquiry, Royal Commissions, government committees, and to be available for consultation on all matters affecting commercial shipping and the nautical profession. to encourage and develop the education training of Canadian seafarers.

Collaborators, Beneficiaries, and Victims

The Company is a constituent member of the Canadian Maritimes Law Association (CMLA) and a member of the International Federation of shipmasters' Associations (IFSMA). The latter organization has consultative status at the International Maritime Organization (IMO). In collaboration with these organizations, the Company is actively supporting the IMO in its initiative to prevent victimization of seafarers through its Guidelines for the Fair Treatment of Seafarers. From this, you can see that there is a natural synergy between the Company and the Mission to Seafarers.

The current increase in marine accidents and insured losses may be reversed by the shipping industry's investment in the human element, in recruitment, training and a focus on the retention of good career-minded people. Pollution, cargo damage, and losses in general may be prevented by such people.

Encouraging Discussion of Today's Maritime Interests

Involved in national and international issues, the Company's divisions continue to stage conferences and seminars, as well as having members attend conferences and present papers. Among the conferences and seminars that we have organized, topics have included a number of current issues such as: "Security of Ships, Ports and Coasts,", a table-top exercise entitled "The Master's Dilemma.", "The Human Element in Shipping", and

a number of seminars and conferences dealing with the environment and "Arctic Shipping: Planning for Emergencies". The activities have been supported by the International Maritime Organization, The Nautical Institute, Classification Societies, and port and shipping industries.

Marine Education and Training for a Career in Shipping

Good-quality marine education and training is available at the five Canadian nautical schools with officer cadet programs. The Company is aware of the need to encourage excellence in training for the sea and provides scholarships from the Capt. G.O. Baugh Memorial Fund, and our own Foundation. Canadians have to be informed of the importance to the nation of its shipping industry. Young people who would aspire to be the master mariners, shipping managers and pilots of the future must be informed that the sophistication of modern ships' operating systems calls for a good high school education, an aptitude for learning and a willingness to gain personal maturity in a rigorous environment, often remote from the amenities and comforts of home.

On the Bridge

The Company's 460 plus members are guided by a representative executive council. Each of the seven regional divisions has its own governing council and its Divisional Vice President. The current National President is Captain Chris Connor. The National Assistant Vice-President is Capt. Marshall Dunbar (Maritimes). The administration is headed by Captain Cynthia Brown (Maritimes) as Secretary and Captain Amanda Slade (a Vancouver Island member, who is currently working in Sydney, NS). Captain Jim Calvesbert is the Chairman of MMC Education Committee.

Our group, the Maritimes Division, representing Nova Scotia, is comprised of approximately 100 members, many of whom the Mission to Seafarers here will be familiar with. Our division head is Capt. Marshall Dunbar, who is supported by the Deputy, Capt. Doug Roe; the Secretary, Capt. Jim Calvesbert; and the Treasurer, Capt. Greg Wilkie. We are pleased to continue to support the Mission's activities through the participation of our members as volunteers in MtS and by sponsoring events such as the Christmas Dinner and Golf Tournament.

CAPTAIN JIM CALVESBERT

In the event that you have not had the pleasure, I introduce Captain Jim Calvesbert. Jim is a true gentleman and scholar as well as an extraordinary ship-welfare volunteer. He has mastered awareness of security, and safety issues relating to port facilities and ships. He is an engaging asset to our outreach ministry and a true pleasure to be around.

You will find him at the Mission many Saturday mornings where he takes special care seeing to the needs of seafarers from all over the world. Always on call when the need arises, Jim has been a member of our family for over 3 years. Jim has sailed with various nationalities in his capacity as a marine consultant and he has vast experience in countries with various religions and cultures. This active volunteer speaks French and offers the perfect skill set for our Halifax Seafarer's Centre. Jim enjoys HAM radio and I understand is learning to play the saxophone. He is a seasoned writer and the editor of the FOGHORN. An inquisitive, compassionate human being.

Jim Calvesbert grew up in Ontario where the Great Lakes probably stimulated an interest in ships and the excitement of being on the water. So, when the opportunity to attend the inaugural class of the Canadian Coast Guard College arose, it wasn't by sea, but by air that he arrived in Sydney, Nova Scotia, During that time, he sailed on Bluenose II, underwent cross training with the Navy during their winter Caribbean training oper-

ations. Jim as a member of the senior class was one of the first to attend the original Coast Guard College at the Point Edward Naval Base. He graduated four years later as a certified ships' officer and his first assignment was aboard a major icebreaker, the Canadian Coast Guard Ship (CCGS) John A. MacDonald headed to the high Arctic for the annual resupply voyage. That trip he was part of the SS Manhattan, the first commercial oil tanker to transit the Northwest Passage in both directions. What an exciting way to begin a 35-year career that was full of wonderful experiences.

Sailing in the Maritimes, Quebec, and becoming certified on hovercraft in British Columbia, Jim eventually returned to his home area of the Great Lakes and sailed on buoy tenders and later held command of Search and Rescue ships. After achieving command, Jim returned to the Coast Guard College as an instructor and in various management positions before

the call from the operational side arose again. To finish out his career with the Coast Guard, Jim served in management positions in the Martimes Regional Headquarters and retired with a world of wonderful memories.

Not that that was the end of his marine involvement, however. Following his retirement, as a marine consultant Jim worked on assignments nationally and internationally in the former republic of Georgia and the United Arab Emirates.

Recently, Jim worked with the cruise industry in Halifax driving double decker tour buses during the cruise season. Strange how the sea keeps coming up in his life. Now, as a ship visiting volunteer at the Mission to Seafarers in Halifax, Iim maintains his contact with seafarers from around the world by making their visits to our port more relaxing and enjoyable. We are truly blessed and hope our relationship continues for years to come. Thank you, Jim, for your passion and commitment. Blessings in abundance to you and yours.
