We took the opportunity to spruce up the Mission during the fall. Privacy rooms were closed off and painted for use as a shoebox storage area. The managers office, chapel, internet cafe and treatment room were painted. What an incredible team of proactive, passionate humanitarians. We are truly blessed.

More troubled waters became apparent when Norman and James ripped up the buckling tiles in our kitchen to find out where a water leak was originating. A wharf rodent had chewed a water hose under the kitchen floor causing substantial water damage. We are

grateful for plumber Mike (retired) from the Halifax Port Authority who came to our rescue immediately.

We are now preparing for the repairs at a cost of \$14,000, most of which we anticipate will be covered by insurance. We are fortunate to have multi-talented volunteers who step up to help resolve these issues. We are grateful to our pandemic partners who have gone the extra mile.

We experienced two full days of operations at the Mission without water due to frozen water pipes. Again, our Halifax Port Authority partners resolved the issue as quickly as possible. Welcome to 2022.
