Hopefully industry corrects the problem and looks to the future and prevents it being repeated.

A number have been identified that sit "on the hard", and many others are abandoned and deteriorating, have broken up, or have been exported elsewhere; soon many will be lost forever. NSHSRS is a new not for profit society formed with the express purpose of reversing this trend and protecting our schooner fleet.

We plan to engage the younger generation, who have less time and disposable income to put into wooden boats, in the Schooner Rescue projects so they can carry on ensuring our maritime heritage is preserved for years to come. And, in the process, build confidence in youth through hands-on skills and sail training, connecting them to a unique part of our history, the ocean and the natural environment.


